



PE & Sport Premium Report

This report sets out how Stepney Park Primary School has used or intends to use the funding available through the PE and Sports Premium. It seeks to make clear how the school has ensured that the funding effectively targets the needs of its pupils. Where applicable, this report also seeks to evaluate the impact of the decisions made. This report is split into two parts:

- **Part 1: PE & Sport Premium Funding.** *This section explains how the school has ensured that this funding is used effectively to promote physical activity. It is organised according to the five indicators recommended by the Department for Education [here](#).*

EVALUATION OF IMPACT

In the academic year 2022-2023, Stepney Park Primary School received £22,748 in PE & Sport Premium funding.

One of the key areas of sports spending in the academic year 2022-2023 was the employment of sports coaches to offer a wider range of physical activities outside of PE lessons, most notably at lunchtime and in after school clubs. These activities were extremely popular and well-attended by children: a number of clubs were oversubscribed through the year. This was effective both in raising the profile of sports at the school and ensuring that children benefit from additional physical activity. At lunchtimes, the structure offered by coaching staff ensured that more children were engaged in more physical activity during this part of the day.

The academic year 2022-2023 also involved two Sports Days following their success when we first held them the previous year. These were very successful, enjoyed by children and well-attended by parents. As such, these days also contributed to raising the profile of sport at Stepney Park. In addition, the establishment of school records offered children an important opportunity to participate in competitive sport.

We aim for our children to engage in and enjoy competitive sport. As such, we used some of our Sport Premium funding to offer children a programme of sporting competitions. Some of these were intra-school competitions (e.g. a football tournament at lunchtimes), while we also organised and hosted competitions with other local schools. These included a football tournament and a para-sports event which was effective at broadening participation in sports of groups who are often underrepresented in competitions.

In summary, the actions taken by the school to make use of its PE & Sports Premium Funding have been effective. It is for this reason that many of the actions will continue into the 2023-2024 academic year.

Action	Cost
Employ a sports coach to offer a range of physical activities to children during their lunchtime.	£7,030
Offer children the chance to benefit from a wide range of sports as part of our after school club provision.	£2,220

Key Indicator 2: Raising the profile of PE, Sports and Physical Activity across the school.

Action	Cost
Organise a high profile Sports Day at Mile End Stadium in the Summer term.	£1000

Key Indicator 3: Increasing the confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and Sport.

Action	Cost
Subscribe to <i>PE Hub</i> to provide planning support to all teachers in PE.	£500
Buy in support from specialist cricket coaches to teach PE alongside the class teacher to develop the class teachers' own provision in teaching cricket.	£600

Key Indicator 4: Offering children a broader range of sports and activities.

Action	Cost
Fund children in key stage 2 to attend Urban Activity Days which offer children a wide range of non-Sport based physical, outdoor activities.	£4000
Offer children in some year groups the chance for regular yoga sessions as a means of broadening their experiences of physical activity.	£7068

Key Indicator 5: Increasing participation in competitive sport.

Action	Cost
Fund cover for teachers to allow them to take children to sports tournaments and competitions.	£1,000

PART 2: Swimming

The data below outlines the proportion of our 22-23 year 6 cohort that have met the National Curriculum requirements in swimming. Please note that at Stepney Park Primary School children learn to swim in years 3 and 4. As such, though this data refers to our year 6 cohort of children, it is based on attainment in previous year groups.

Swimming Attainment Data	
Percentage of year 6 children who can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.	9% NB. This cohort missed more than half of their planned swimming teaching due to the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
Percentage of year 6 children who can use a range of strokes effectively.	7% NB. This cohort missed more than half of their planned swimming teaching due to the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
Percentage of year 6 children who can perform a safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.	8% NB. This cohort missed more than half of their planned swimming teaching due to the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
